



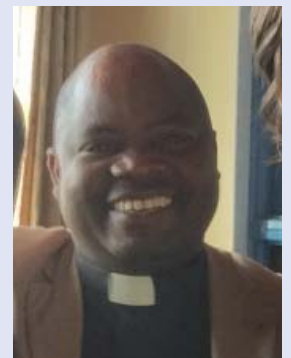
All Saints' Cathedral, Buyé

The complex at Buyé Hill dates from the 1930s when missionaries of the East African Revival Movement arrived from Rwanda. It was the first Anglican presence in Burundi; up until that time the Roman Catholic church was the only established Christian denomination in what was then a Belgian colony. Buyé was chosen as the site of the first Anglican Cathedral because the nearby city of Ngozi already had a Catholic cathedral.

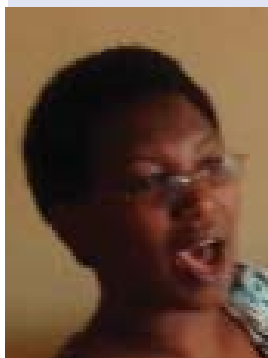
In addition to the Cathedral, the complex includes a Bible college, a secondary school, a hospital, and housing for the Bishop and other clergy. All these facilities are owned and operated by the Anglican Diocese.



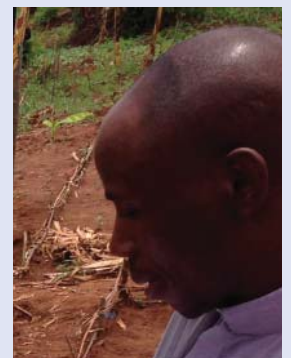
